Bishop Urges Weeding Out

RIO DE JANEIRO, Sept. 21 (UP)—The Bishop of Sao Paulo, Mgr. Carlos Duarte Costa, in a telegram to President Getulio Vargas today, urged that priests with Fascist and Falangist tendencies be forced to retire "in order to prevent in Brazil what happened in France."

The message urged spiritual mobilization as well as military mobilization in Brazil.

Several German priests and nuns, who have been operating clandestine radio transmitters hidden under altars and in cemetery chapels, were arrested in five different localities, dispatches from the State of Santa Catalina reported today.

Santa Catalina has the largest German population of any State in Brazil.

Once Lost in Jungle

In the Spring of 1931 Count di Robilant was lost in the Brazilian jungles for eighteen days. He had taken off in a plane with a mechanic to survey the possibilities of an airline and had made a forced landing. He barely survived the jungle ordeal and his mechanic died.

He reported that lack of fuel had made the landing necessary and that lack of food had made the trek through the jungle a serious problem. Part of the time he had to carry the injured mechanic but the greatest discomfort, he
